



Travel Photography Mindset

Finding the Location

The first step in travel photography is to establish the location for the viewer. There are several ways to do this:

- **Names on boats:** Look for the home port listed on the side of boats.
- **Murals and Tourist Items:** Touristy areas often display the location's name prominently. Simplify the image to focus on the name.
- **Creative Exploration:** Look for the location's name on sidewalks, signs, and banners, even if it requires creative angles.
- **License Plates and Manhole Covers:** These can sometimes include the location's name.
- **Flags:** Flags, especially those with the location's name or identifiable symbols, are great indicators.



The idea is to find visual cues that immediately tell the viewer where the photo was taken.

Capturing Foreign Language and Unique Text

Search out text that is not in your native language. This immediately informs viewers that they are "somewhere other than home".

- **Foreign Language Signs:** Capture signs in languages you don't understand.
- **Hand-Painted Signs:** Look for hand-painted signs, which are increasingly rare in many parts of the world.

Exploring Local Markets

Local markets are visually interesting places to capture the essence of a location.

- **Simplify the Scene:** Avoid cluttered shots; aim for simple, easy-to-absorb images.
- **Focus on Prices and Products:** Capture prices with unfamiliar currency symbols and products unique to the area.
- **Respectful Photography:** Be mindful of vendors' comfort levels. Shoot from behind or the side if they seem uncomfortable.



Photographing Locals

Capturing locals engaged in their daily lives adds authenticity to your travel photos.

- **Candid Moments:** Aim for natural-looking photos where people aren't posing.
- **45-Degree Angle:** Shooting at a 45-degree angle can make you less intrusive.
- **Be Quick:** Practice capturing images quickly to avoid disrupting the scene.
- **Engaged Locals:** If locals are willing to pose, take the opportunity, but avoid generic poses like the peace sign.



Avoiding Tourist Clutter

Tourists who don't seem to belong in the scene can detract from your images.

- **Tilt Up:** Tilt your camera up to exclude tourists from the frame.
- **Street Performers:** Street performers can add interest, but respect their wishes regarding photography.
- **Use People as Elements:** Incorporate people as elements in the photo, but not necessarily as the main focus.



Utilizing Long Exposure

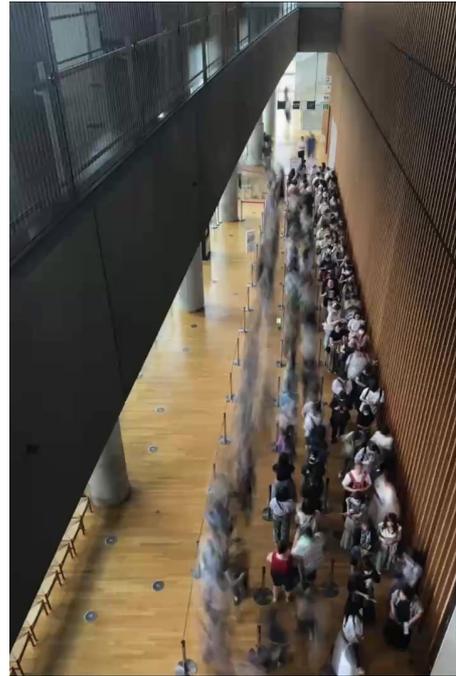
Consider using long exposure techniques to create interesting effects.

- **Live Photo Mode:** Use the Live Photo mode on iPhones to create long exposures, blurring moving people.
- **Selfie Takers:** Capture people taking selfies, as they are less likely to notice you.

Establishing Shots, Medium Shots, and Details

When photographing an area, capture a variety of shots to provide context.

7. **Establishing Shot:** Capture an overall view of the area to provide context.
8. **Medium Shot:** Zoom in a bit to show more detail.
9. **Detail Shot:** Focus on specific, interesting details.

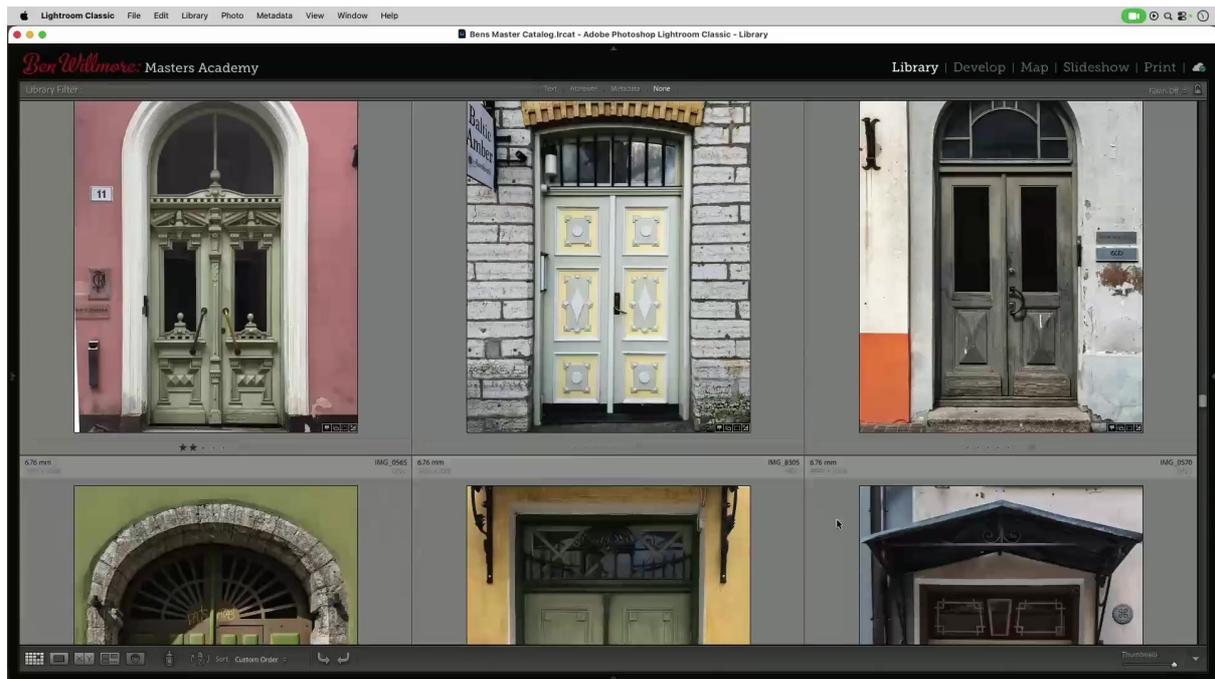


This approach helps tell a complete visual story.

Finding Unique Series

Look for unique, repetitive elements that can be captured as a series.

- **Repetitive Elements:** Identify elements like doors, knockers, or house numbers that are unique to the location.
- **Consistent Shots:** Shoot these elements consistently to create a cohesive series.
